The Oak Academy Trust

On the 1st of July 2015 the school converted to an academy primary school and set up 'The Oak Academy Trust' – a multi-academy trust with Barnham Primary School as the first and flagship school. Since the conversion the Trust has developed strong partnerships with both MATs and maintained schools, as well as other educational partners. Academisation has been an enabling, empowering and exciting step for the school community and one that was taken in order to design a future for our children which has their needs at the centre of all that we do and which provides flexibility in order to adjust and adapt to priorities as they arise and the ever shifting landscape of our community.

Partnerships

At Barnham we are incredibly passionate about our educational role at the heart of the local community, and believe that we should be responsible in providing an environment that is increasingly sustainable and focused on continuing to develop links with schools within the Villages Locality as well as developing links with schools and organisations within the county and beyond. Since 2015 we have worked in partnership with the UCL Institute of Education to provide their professional qualification for Middle and Senior Leaders. We now work with GLF to facilitate the NPQ training for Senior Leaders, as well as leading training on emotional and behavioural development for Key Stage 1 practitioners. In 2017 we joined a newly introduced regional MAT forum, as well as joining with two other local MATs to form a collaborative school improvement partnership called the FLOW group. Plus, we are a strategic member of the NOVIO – SEND hub. Hampshire County Council act as our moderators. For School Improvement we work with a variety of providers depending upon the improvement area required.

Location

Our school serves a suburban community of mixed housing. Located at the heart of the 'Six Village Area', the school lies on the Sussex coastal plain between Chichester, Arundel, Littlehampton and Bognor.





Approximately a third of our pupils come from out of catchment. Of those many commute from Yapton, Eastergate, and Westergate. Other places pupils commute from include: Aldingbourne, Walberton, Chichester, Fontwell, Rustington, and Oving. The school is currently placed in IDACI and IMD groups 4 for KS2 and KS1, with 22% of households falling into 'High Social Class Households'. Yapton where 10% of our pupils commute from, is currently a ward recognised as being in the 20% most deprived wards nationally.

Local housing developments are rapidly increasing in number and size around the Barnham and 6 Villages area. A Local Plan is in place which has at the centre of it's goals, improvements for health, education and social care. However, until these additional services come on line, increased pressure is being placed on front line services to manage and support the increase in need of the families joining the community, of which we are one.

Groups

The school is a slightly larger-than-average primary school with a stable roll. Most pupils are White British. Few pupils are from minority ethnic backgrounds or speak English as an additional language, although this is an area of positive growth over the past few years and continues to rise, resulting in our school community becoming increasingly diverse. The proportion of pupils known to be eligible for the pupil premium is low when compared to the national average, but has increased in recent years. The proportion of disabled pupils and those who have special educational needs supported through SEND Support is above average. The proportion of children supported with a statement of special educational needs or Education Health Care Plans is above the national average. The individual needs of these children has become more complex in recent years and has changed the pupil demographics of the school. There is an on-site unit for pupils with physical disabilities and speech and language difficulties (see our Local Offer on the school's website). Currently, there are 300 pupils on roll with 44 children in Year R, 44 children in Year 1, 45 children in Year 2, 44 children in Year 3, 45 children in Year 4, 32 children in Year 5 and 46 children in Year 6. The school has a PAN of 45 and is organised as follows:

- 1 Year R Class
- 1 mixed class of Year R and Year 1
- 1 Year 1 Class
- 1 Year 2 Class
- 1 mixed class of Year 2 and Year 3
- 1 Year 3 Class
- 1 class of Year 4
- 1 class of Year 4 and Year 5
- 1 mixed class of Year 5 and Year 6
- 1 class of Year 6

Barnham Primary School is an inclusive school and we pride ourselves on our inclusive values, the heart of which is ensuring increasing participation and outcomes for all children. We are proud of our skills in being able to support and develop children who have specific learning needs, particularly those children who have physical disabilities and speech and language needs. The school has developed a very positive reputation both locally and county wide for inclusion and high quality provision and understanding of children with SEND, and we are asked regularly by the area SEND Hub and by the locality schools to work with them to support staff development and raise standards for SEND provision in their schools. Our positive and proactive approach to Inclusion brings with it many challenges and pressures that we as a school work tremendously hard to overcome and find solutions for. This can impact upon standards and has resulted in the school community becoming further complex and challenging as the breadth and amount of need has increased over time.

Special Support Centre

SSC

Barnham Primary School has an SSC (known as The Orchard) funded for 12 children with physical disabilities (including visual impairment) and speech and language needs. The children from the SSC are taught in mainstream classes but receive enhanced support from experienced staff and outside agencies, including regular visits from Speech and Language Therapists and Physiotherapists, and QTVIs. Regular visits from the Sensory Support team, Moving and Handling team and Occupational Therapy teams also provide expert advice for increasing outcomes for pupils. The SSC has a wet room with H-frame hoist, physio plinth and disabled toilet. It also has a physiotherapy/intervention room with H-frame hoist and a variety of physiotherapy equipment including corner seats, benches, physio mats and gym balls. Where appropriate, children from the SSC access physiotherapy and postural management strategies within the mainstream classrooms to maximise learning opportunities.





Our Curriculum

Our curriculum is ever evolving and adapting to meet the needs of our various cohorts with its primary aims of helping our children be successful, confident and responsible. We continue to work in order for our curriculum to adapt as our children grow, with our staff team working both collectively and with individual responsibility to move it forward. A key focus has been the evolution of the SRE and pastoral part of the curriculum which is called 'Shine'. This is an area which is centred on the aim of helping all our pupils shine individually, as part of a team and within a community now and in the future.
